Membership Meeting Minutes

Thursday, December 13, 2012

Draft to be submitted for approval on 1/17/2013

The December meeting of the Membership of the Fairfax County Federation of Citizens Associations was called to order by 1st Vice President Rob Jackson at 7:30 p.m. at the Hidden Oaks Nature Center in Annandale Program.

Program

Our two guest speakers discussed current topics related to home energy conservation and home solar systems. The two presentations addressed what we can do to reduce energy costs and to solar power our neighborhoods.

Energy Action Fairfax: Ms. Susan Hafeli, Fairfax County Utility Analyst, told us about the Energy Action Fairfax program. Ms. Hafeli manages the County's \$9.6 million federal stimulus energy grant which includes conducting energy audits in a number of communities in Fairfax County, some of which are Federation Members. She seeks to expand the program to commercial users in collaboration with the Chamber of Commerce.

Solar Powering Your Community: Mr. Philip Haddix, Project Manager for The Solar Foundation, described Solar Powering Your Community: Impediments to Residential Solar in Virginia. Mr. Haddix manages The Solar Foundation's projects and performs research in support of new and existing initiatives. In particular, he is active in executing the foundation's duties under the SunShot Solar Outreach Partnership program and provides research and management support on several labor market and schools-based projects.

1st Vice President Rob Jackson thanked our guest speakers and presented each with a Federation mug.

Administrative and Organizational Topics

Representatives to Other Organizations: Linda Boone, 2nd Vice President: The Federation seeks volunteers to represent us to the Citizens Corps Council and to the Criminal Justice Advisory Board. Federation needs to reappoint Mark Tipton to the Trails and Sidewalks Committee and John Jennison to the Community Revitalization and Reinvestment Advisory Group; both appointments have expired, but she understands that both are continuing to serve.

The Bulletin (newsletter): Fred Costello, Editor—The deadline for articles for the January newsletter is December 30.

Approval of Board Meeting Minutes: Ed Wyse, Recording Secretary: The membership approved the minutes of the November 2012 membership meeting.

Treasurer's Report: Scott Schlegel, Treasurer—Scott provided a nine-page written report and told us that membership dues of \$100 from three associations were received in the last seven days. The board voted to receive and file the report.

Membership: Three new members have joined the Federation: Holmes Run Acres Civic Association, Huntington Grove Home Owners Association, and Skyline House Unit Owners Association.

Webmaster Report: Jeff Parnes, Webmaster—no report.

Citizen of the Year: Jeff Parnes, COY Chair—The nomination period opened December 1 and will close January 31.

Old Business

New and Miscellaneous Business

Board & Committee Reports

Budget Committee: Rob Jackson and Linda Boone—Linda described the actions the board took at its December meeting and will continue at its January meeting to prepare for the review of the county's budget. In short the board has been refining a two-page document, Process for Budget Review for FY 2014-15 Budget, which includes sections on principles for review, focus budget items for review, leads for review areas, and format for budget resolutions. They will have a final document to discuss at the January Board meeting.

Citizens Association Services: Don Hinman—First, Don proposed three ideas for future meeting programs, that could be scheduled as early as March 2013: boards and residents in conflict—rights and responsibilities of HOA/condo boards and residents when there is significant conflict, questions of legitimacy, or both; assessment collection issues with non-resident owners, particularly owners receiving housing program subsidies; and incorporation and insurance issues—pros and cons for voluntary civic associations. Second, Don also asked district council representatives two questions. Would these topics be of interest for a District Council meeting, which we could publicize county-wide? Could the Federation arrange a meeting on one of these topics at your usual District Council location, but not as part of a District Council meeting?

Education: Leonard Bumbaca, Ed Saperstein, & Tim Thompson—The committee has provided to the school board its recommended criteria to consider in selecting a new superintendent. The Federation's January 17 membership meeting will be held at the FCPS Administrative Center to review the school district's budget. The group discussed the pros and cons of expanding the advanced studies program.

Environment: Flint Webb—Flint submitted this report via e-mail for inclusion in the minutes.

Introduction to Water Quality Regulations Effecting Urban Trees – December 6

The Northern Virginia Urban Forestry held their 4th Quarterly Roundtable in Herndon. The topic was an Introduction to Water Quality Regulations Affecting Urban Trees. The speakers were:

Bruce McGranahan from Land Development Services, Fairfax County. Bruce spoke on New Virginia Stormwater Regulations. The phosphate limit for Virginia is 0.41 lb/ac/year. The new regulations will go live on July 1, 2014. From the County's perspective the State has delegated authority to issue Virginia Stormwater Management Permit authority to the Counties. The Commonwealth (and the Federal EPA through the County's MS4 permit) will hold the County responsible for meeting the pollution goals. One major change is that the Bay Total Maximum Daily Load (TMDL) will require that the 1" storm is considered in evaluating the performance of controls – not the major storms that have been the focus previously.

Joan Salvati from the Department of Conservation and Recreation. Joan spoke on the Chesapeake Bay TMDL 'Pollution

Diet'. The take home message is that once DCR started looking at the modeling that EPA used to set the TMDL they realized that their data was way out of date. They modeled based on how the County was years ago and now the amount of impervious surfaces is much greater than it was in the model. The stormwater management controls were also out of date so one of the major efforts that the County needs to do is to develop a good inventory of all the stormwater management Best Management Practices (BMPs) being used in the County and keep up the list every year. There was a question about rumors about the Bay TMDL program being taken over by the Department of Environmental Quality (DEQ). DEQ currently handles the point source TMDL program but DCR handles the area source TMDL programs. The explanation is that if DEQ takes over the areas source TMDL program they will also be taking over the personnel.

Buck Kline from the Virginia Department of Forestry who spoke on Forest Land Conservation. Mr. Kline was concerned that the regulations don't give credit for reducing forest loss. He also mentioned that the Forestry department has a simple on-line calculator that can be used to calculate the value of the trees on any property at https://inforest.frec.vt.edu/.

After the presentations Jim McGlone with the Virginia Department of Forestry facilitated a discussion about how to use the information about the TMDL to encourage planting and saving trees. Mr. McGlone also discussed the need to track new tree plantings. Anyone how has a new tree planting project should send information about the planting to the DoF. They will need the number of trees, the number of volunteers involved with the planting, the number of volunteer hours, the location of the plantings and the date.

After lunch there was a discussion about future projects in two broad categories: the need to educate and the need to gather accurate data about tree cover and the tree inventory. One project that will be of particular interest to the Federation is the need to educate Home Owner Associations on the importance of and proper maintenance of trees. Another effort will be to educate landscaping companies on the proper way to plant new trees and how to pick good tree stock.

USGS Lecture: Bird's Eye View: Offshore Wind Energy – December 5

I attended the USGS Public Lecture Series. The subject was Birds at Sea and Offshore Wind Energy. The speakers were Alicia Berlin and Allan O'Connell. The upshot of their research so far is that there is not enough information about the migration patterns of sea birds to determine that off shore wind generators will not interfere with their migration patterns. However, the Bureau of Ocean Energy is very actively researching the issue and are using the information as soon as it is collected when evaluating possible offshore wind lease areas. The plan is to not allow leases in areas frequently visited by sea birds. The problem is that sea birds are so far out at sea that they are not seen by land-based birders.

Planning Commission Environmental Committee – November 29

At the November 29th Planning Commission Environmental Committee they approved the Green Building Comprehensive Plan Policy Guidance. The Committee is considering expanding the policy developed for the Tysons Corner Urban Center to other parts of the County. The Committee could also not reach

a consensus on whether and how to deal with public-private partnerships.

Westchester House in the RPA - November 28

I met with the homeowner next to the Westchester Drive property that is going to be built entirely in the Long Branch of the Accotink. The developer mistakenly cut down a tree in the neighbor's yard and the neighbor wanted the developer to save a maple that was scheduled to be cut down as compensation for the tree that was mistakenly taken down but there was a question about the viability of the tree. We met with the County arborist to evaluate the tree. The arborist noticed that the tree had been split through and had healed. The County arborist felt that the tree was not safe due to the split and would have recommended that it be taken down before the house could be occupied in any event.

Friends of Accotink Creek - November 19

Attended the Friends of Accotink Creek meeting. There was a presentation by Vivian Morgan-Mendez and Fernando Mendez of Friends of Nottoway. They discussed the 12-year successful battle to save Nottoway woods from ball field expansion. The group is now turning their attention to solving erosion problems in the woods. Other issues that were discussed were:

- Metro West construction sediment control violations.
- Eleven Oaks Development and how to track sediment controls.
- Developing a way to track major development projects so we can keep an eye on sediment controls better.
- Developing a program to update civic associations on the progress on watershed management plans.
- Katie Keating's Girl Scout Gold project to replace an information kiosk. And
- A video production of stream cleanup.

Braddock District Council: Art Wells—(due to an injury Art could not attend; he relayed this report via Ed Wyse)—The annual "Taste of Braddock" evening on December 5th was a huge success; with 300 attendees who enjoyed cuisine from 20 food establishments within Braddock District. The meeting of Braddock District's "Aging in Place" committee on December 12th featured an informative, stimulating discussion by Judy and Mike Canning of the highly successful "Capitol Hill Village" covering its origin, organization, operations, and programs. In attendance was Patricia Rohrer from the Fairfax County Health Department.

Lee District Council of Civic Organizations: Chris Soule—(Don Hinman reporting) Earlier this month the council held its annual Holiday Banquet and presented Les Dorson Public Service awards to Judy Flaig (Election Manager), Grant McIntosh (Lead Chaplain of the Fairfax County Fire Department) and Carl Sell (for years of service as Planning Commissioner, promoting

historical awareness on the Franconia Museum board, and numerous other volunteer activities).

Mason District Council: Roger Hoskin—The council will host a Town Hall Discussion on January 15th, 7p.m. at Annandale United Methodist Church on Columbia Pike. Scheduled guests include Supervisor Penny Gross, School Board Representative Sandy Evans, Captain Gun Lee, and Code Enforcement Representative Susan Epstein. The 2012 Neighborhood Survey results will be revealed and discussed.

Providence District Council: Flint Webb— Flint provided this report to the board via e-mail.

The program for the October 20 Providence District Council Meeting was Preparing for Major Emergencies. Marcelo Farreira from the Fairfax County Office of Emergency Management provided information on how to plan for major emergencies. Take home messages:

Set up a communication point outside the county for all family members to call into.

Look in on your neighbors and make sure they don't need help.

Communities should establish a Community Emergency Response Plan and the County can help.

Sign up for the County's emergency notification system to get accurate and timely information about emergencies.

Marcelo also discussed the capabilities, limitations and failure of the 911 system. The County has a reverse 911 capability which allows them to send out emergency messages to specific areas, but with more and more people relying on cell phones the reverse 911 system has some limitations. The reverse 911 system was used during Sandy to notify the Huntington community to evacuate. The other limitation of the reverse 911 system and other notification capabilities is that to notify too early or to be too alarmist will cause the public to pay less attention in the future. Marcelo also told the story of what the 911 shutdown looked like at the Emergency Management Center.

Cemetery Preservation

Mary Lipsey, president of the non-profit Fairfax County Cemetery Preservation Association (www.honorfairfaxcemeteries.org) and a retired FCPS teacher, is looking for volunteer help.

Over 300 cemeteries, scattered around our county, are family/ community cemeteries. Some family cemeteries have been completely obliterated by development. For example, one was located at the JEB Stuart High school athletic fields area prior to its construction. Today there are no grave stones and no records of the bodies ever being removed from the area. Another was located at the site of the Fairfax County Government Center. The bodies were reinterred to a commercial cemetery on Braddock Road. Since that cemetery does not allow vertical stones, some of the original grave stones lie in a landscaped area in the front of the government center.

A large family cemetery, that dates back to the beginning of the Civil War and is across Little River Turnpike from NVCC in Annandale, has had three clean ups by scouts and needs it again.

These old cemeteries are the final resting places of citizens of Fairfax County, whose lives helped make the county what it is today. Many of these family cemeteries are abandoned or neglected.

The Fairfax County Cemetery Preservation Association is trying to get community groups to adopt a cemetery. All that would be involved is maintaining the grounds, picking up trash, and calling the police and our association if any vandalism is noted. This is not a legal arrangement, more like a community initiative similar to adopt a highway.
