President's Message

Greetings: Federation Members, Officers, and Board Members I first hope you had the best Holiday Season and have a happy, healthy and prosperous 2014.

I would also be amiss were I not to thank the many "Federation people" who have contacted me with best wishes or otherwise kept me in their thoughts and prayers during my ongoing recovery. I suffered a seizure on November 5. "Nasty bacteria" found its way into my bloodstream and the left frontal lobe of my brain. Doctors found and removed an abscess on my brain. But with rest, doctors' visits, lots of needles and tests, and many pills, I am on my way to full recovery. I consider myself very fortunate as the seizure occurred on a day when I went to the office, rather than work alone at home, and because I have so many wonderful and caring friends and acquaintances.

2013 was significant for me for other reasons. First, I was humbled by the Federation's trust in me to be its new president, a task that is made easier by my excellent team of officers. Second, I am proud of how well the Federation has responded to and influenced government decision-making on two issues of key importance to the homeowners of Fairfax County. One is the proposed reorganization of our libraries. Federation volunteers worked feverously to provide community input to the County. Consequently, the County abandoned its "Beta Plan" that would have made our libraries "almost bookless". We will continue to work on this issue to ensure the libraries evolve in ways that meet community desires.

We also have had a major impact on the County's proposed amendment to the zoning ordinance to permit the construction of one-room residential studio units (RSUs) apartments for lower-income residents. By working with housing advocates, staff and elected officials, the Federation has persuaded the County to modify the proposal such that RSUs would not be permitted in low-density residential neighborhoods yet provide sufficient housing choices for county residents. The Federation will remain active on all important land use issues.

Among our endeavors for 2014, we will represent the homeowners of Fairfax County and their local associations in areas such as: the County and School budgets; the real estate tax rate; the proposed independent school auditor; ensuring community input to transportation projects and their funding; reduction of litter; enforcement of occupancy limits; emergency preparation; increasing community input to land use decisions; and addressing the needs of an aging population.

Come work with us as we work together to protect and enhance the quality of life in Fairfax County.

The Count Board of Supervisors approved the county taking over maintenance of HOA BMP's.



Apartment Buildings next to Your House?

The Fairfax Federation was at least temporarily successful in having the County change its proposed policy of allowing Residential Studio Units (RSU's) to be put into every residential district. The Mason District Council was instrumental in the Federation's success, organizing many meetings and activating many citizens. The proposed change in the zoning ordinance would have allowed new "houses" and remodeled existing houses to contain between three and 75 apartments, 250-to-500 sq. ft. each. The Federation resolution, as sent to County officials, called for limiting the RSU's to areas zoned R-20 or higher. The resolution and the public outcry caused the chairman of the County's RSU committee to call for limiting such buildings to areas zoned R-12 or higher, although the Federation's analysis showed that there are enough areas zoned R-20 and above to the accommodate the demand forecast by the George Mason University's Center for Regional Analysis.

The Federation's success is considered a "temporary" because the County has not finalized the program.

- Speak at every public opportunity; if you can't be there, make sure someone else is.
- 9. Do everything you can think of as fast as you think of it.

We could all learn from Kathy's success — and her hundreds of hours of labor.

Membership Meeting Minutes

Thursday, November 21, 2013

Draft to be submitted for approval on 1/16/2014

The November meeting of the membership of the Fairfax County Federation of Citizens Associations was called to order by First Vice-President Ed Wyse at 7:38 p.m. at Mason District Government Center.

President Rob Jackson has been ill and could not preside at the meeting. We wish him a speedy recovery.

There is a meeting quorum. See membership sign-in.

<u>Program: Chief Roessler, Fairfax County Police</u> <u>Department</u>

Colonel Ed Roessler, the new Police Chief for Fairfax County provided his Vision for the Police Department. His goal is described as ethical leadership through engagement with the community. The Police Department is the 32nd largest police department in the county, yet the county has the lowest crime rate for our size. The department also has the lowest officer to per capita ratio in the 50 largest communities in the country. He emphasized a culture of safety -prevent and fight crime-gun turn in program will start in January 2014. The department needs to keep pace with urbanization, e.g., working with Zoning in Tysons to design enough police coverage for the new areas. The department plans to use foot patrols, bikes, and segues to police shopping and metro locations. The demographics of the department do not match the demographics of the community. One of 25 applicants is hired into the department. Chief Roessler is looking for more diversity in newly recruited police officers. He wants to develop future police officers through the Explorer program for kids ages 14-18.

Emergency Preparedness—3 divisions in the police department respond to emergencies. The Incident Commander for police is located at each District. He highlighted the close working relationship between the Police and Fire Departments in the county.

The Chief answered questions from members about:

- the role of the Police and Sheriff's Departments. Sheriff's operate the Adult Detention Center and Courthouse. The departments work together and share the same academy for training. Their civil disturbance teams work together.
- Use of Informants. He discussed the legal standards and policies that apply.
- World Games in 2015. A CEO, Mr. Knight, has been hired to raise funds and coordinate the venues. Volunteers are needed to help at the sites. There will be a Volunteer Coordinator hired also to recruit and manager the 4000 volunteers required to make this event happen. The games begin on June 26, 2015 and will run for 15 days at venues throughout the region.

Vice President Wyse presented the Chief with a Federation mug in recognition of his informative presentation to the membership.

Administrative Matters

Approval of Board Meeting Minutes: The October Membership minutes were approved unanimously as presented; filed for the record.

There was no other urgent business for the membership.

Legislative Resolution

Frank Anderson, co-chair of the Legislative Committee, assumed control of the meeting and introduced items for consideration of the membership regarding legislative priorities. There will be a weighed voting to prioritize the items later.

Items A-F were previously approved at the October Membership meeting including: Implement the Iowa Plan for Reapportionment; Restore rule violation enforcement authority to HOAs and Condominium Associations; Permit local school boards to set opening day; Provide additional state funding for quality pre-kindergarten education; Hold FCPS harmless with regard to the LCI and revise the LCI formula; and Make use of hand-held phone when operating a motor vehicle a primary offense.

Don Hinman spoke to an additional item – Seeking restoration of authority for Boards to change HOA documents. Vote: unanimously for.

Litter Reduction —discussion opened by Flint Webb and seconded by John Cockayne. Previous legislation package supported this item and the Federation needs to be able to support projects that arise. Vote: _17 Yea _6 Nay _0 Abstentions

Discussion

McLean Citizens Association had concerns that there was not enough time to consider these proposals and will not support any of the items.

There was discussion about whether the members could support legislative positions without having specific language. The format of the resolution will contain only subject, position, and rationale. These are general concepts for legislation that the Federation would like to see. Federation Legislative Committee can then craft specific positions to make them more consistent in tense, tone and format. We want our legislators to know what is on our minds.

Deer Control—John Birch moved and it was seconded to discuss control of the white deer population in Fairfax County. Jim McGlone, Urban Forestry, may have data to add to this subject. Commercial hunting permits would have to be done by the State. The addition of deer fences along major roads and other methods could require state involvement. Federation should remove reference to Fairfax County since this is a state issue. Vote: 15 Yea 5 Nay 0 Abstentions

Climate Change—Moved by Flint Webb, seconded by John Birch. Discussion included encouragement of renewable energy sources. Vote: 21 Yea 3 Nay 0 Abstentions

Reporting Transportation Performance Measures to the Public—John Birch moved and Ed Wyse seconded the item. Discussion included the value of performance measures and standards for projects—reducing travel time would be a measure that means something to residents. Normalizing the values of certain projects so public can understand them easier. Vote: _22 Yea _3 Nay _0 Abstentions

Mobility and Accessibility—Moved by John Birch and seconded by Don Hinman. This issue was in the public safety program last year but was moved to Transportation this year. The item is similar to the previous year's resolution.

Could include sidewalks, new transit facilities, etc. How is this not allowed now? There was confusion about the subject and the purpose of this legislation. Vote: _5 Yea _17 Nay _0 Abstentions

Two members expressed further concerns that they had not seen the legislative items before tonight.

Prioritization of the legislative items occurred at the end of the meeting.

Overall Vote to adopt the legislative package was moved and seconded. Vote: _20 Yea _3 Nay _0 Abstentions

Old Business/New Business

Citizen of the Year Banquet will be held Sunday, April 27, 2014, at the Tysons Corner Crown Plaza.

Don Hinman offered comments and requested members contact legislators now. December 2 is the cutoff to have legislation drafted. The Federation would like contact names of each member HOA so that they can be contacted when the Federation needs support for various legislation during the upcoming session. First Vice President Wyse will be collecting the names.

Prioritization of Legislative Package

The members prioritized their support for the above legislative issues by voting on the previous legislative items. The results will be tabulated after the meeting.

Membership meeting adjourned at 10:00 p.m.

To Fairfax County's State Legislators

The following letter was written by Rob Jackson, Federation President, to the State legislators who represent any part of Fairfax County.

I am writing on behalf of the Fairfax County Federation of Citizens Associations ("Federation") and its members, throughout the county, to transmit our 2014 Legislative Program (copy attached). After considerable research, review and discussion, the Federation members voted to select the following ten items as our priorities for the 2014 General Assembly. We respectfully request your support for each of these items. The items are in order of importance as determined by the members.

Making the use of a handheld cellular phone while driving a primary offense, while continuing to permit the use of hands-free devices.

Restoring the ability of homeowners and condominium associations to impose fines on members for rules violations with appropriate safeguards.

Holding Fairfax County Public Schools ("FCPS") harmless with respect to changes in the Local Composite Index ("LCI") and making appropriate changes to the LCI to reflect the higher cost of living and school operations in Fairfax County.

Permitting all local school boards to set the opening day for school.

Providing additional state funding for quality prekindergarten education.

Implementing the "lowa Plan" for General Assembly reapportionment.

Encouraging the use of renewable energy sources.

Making appropriate legislative changes that would help reduce litter.

Supporting performance-based reporting for transportation projects (road, transit, public transport).

Controlling White Tail Deer.

The Federation exists to protect and enhance the quality of life and to advocate for the interests of homeowners in Fairfax County as expressed by their homeowners, condominium, citizens and civic associations. While we speak in their name, the message is theirs. These are your constituents' priorities as determined by our member associations' votes. We respectfully urge you to listen to them.

We understand the complexities of the legislative program and that not every legislative change passes immediately. But we do urge you to work towards their accomplishment. If you have questions or concerns about our priorities, please do not hesitate to contact me. The Federation's board is here to work with you.
